JILL G. HALL is the author of two historical novels, *The Black Velvet Coat*, an international Book Award Finalist for Best New Fiction, and *The Silver Shoes*. Her poems have appeared in a variety of publications. MAGGIE SHIPSTEAD is the New York Times best-selling author of the novels Astonish Me and Seating Arrangements, which won the Dylan Thomas Prize, and the Los Angeles Times Book Prize for First Fiction. A third novel, Great Circle, is on its way. She is a graduate of Harvard and the Iowa Writer's Workshop, and she was a Wallace Stegner Fellow at Stanford. A frequent contributor to Travel + Leisure Magazine, Maggie is an avid traveler with a special passion for the polar regions. In 2012 and 2018, she was a National Magazine Award finalist for fiction. Maggie lives in Los Angeles.



RUFI THORPE grew up in Southern California, attended Eugene Lang College in New York at the age of 16 where she majored in literature and creative writing. She was accepted as a Henry Hoyns Fellow at the University of Virginia's MFA program. After some fun years of teaching composition to undergraduates, she sold her first novel, The Girls from Corona Del Mar, that was long-listed for the Dylan Thomas and Flaherty-Dunnan First Novel Prize. Rufi's second novel, Dear Fang, with Love came out in 2016, and her third novel, The Knockout Queen, is due in April 2020.

AAUW Has Been Giving for More Than 130 Years

The first Western ACA American Fellowship, now known as the American Fellowship, was awarded in 1888 to Ida Street. Considered a "woman of rare culture and accomplishments," Street studied at the University of Michigan for two years and contributed essays and poems to numerous periodicals, including the New Englander.

In 1890, Louisa Holman Richardson was awarded \$500 to study at Newham College in Cambridge, England. Richardson earned her bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees from Boston University and was a professor of Latin, Greek, and art history at Carleton College.

In 1920, the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (the predecessor to AAUW) helped raise money to purchase a gram of radium for Marie Curie. It was an effort led by Marie Meloney, a journalist and editor of The Delineator women's magazine. Meloney had interviewed Curie. During their discussion, the scientist stated she was in short supply of radium, an element that she had discovered. Meloney asked, "If you had the whole world to choose from, what would you take?" Curie replied, "I need a gram of radium to continue my research, but I cannot buy it; radium is too dear for me."

A collaboration between the San Clemente-Capistrano Bay and Laguna Beach branches of AAUW (with the Mission Viejo-Saddleback Valley branch coming on board very soon), TTAG SOC will extend and expand the Tech Trek (TT) experience for alumnae, inspiring and informing them about STEM careers, while keeping them connected to AAUW and the Tech Trek program. At the meeting, alumnae learned how to apply to be a junior counselor, and they heard how the future of TT depends on alumnae. One goal of TTAG is to help feed the camper-to-camp director pipeline! The meeting followed a program in which a panel of three women STEM professionals shared their educational and career experiences along with plenty of advice for the girls!

The panelists included Captain Janell Hanf, an active duty logistics officer in the US Marine Corps; Jennifer Ton, president and founder of BioRox® Inc., a gene therapy and biologics CMC (chemistry, manufacturing and controls) consulting company; and Dr. Alice Apkarian, retired chemistry professor (adjunct) at Saddleback College.

Despite their very different paths and careers, the same messages came through in all three presentations: seize opportunities when they arise, create opportunities when they do not; pursue your interests; don't be afraid of change; don't shut any doors unnecessarily, and mathematics is the foundation for all STEM—keep studying it!
