If you've been looking for ideas on how to get more women engaged in politics, you will want to join us for a webinar on "GovTrek: How to Rock the Next Generation." Lee Winocur Field, dual member with AAUW-LB and a primary member of the San Clemente/Capistrano Bay Branch, is also the AAUW College/University Advisor for AAUW CA. She announced the winner of the first Irvine Valley College (IVC) AAUW scholarship. Sara Moradi, the current president of AAUW@IVC, was awarded this \$1500 scholarship to support one member of the on-campus AAUW Student Organization who is transferring to a four-year university. The funds will go to UCI, Sara's school of choice, to support her tuition and books. Sara was one of the founders of the AAUW Club at IVC, and she intends to do the same when she arrives at UCI. UCI has never had an AAUW branch for undergraduates on that campus. It is Sara's intention to change that situation as soon as she gets there.

Spotlight on JEAN BROTHERTON

Ninth generation Californian, Jean Rockwell Brotherton was born in Santa Barbara. She is a direct descendant of Sgt. Jose Francisco Ortega who was the pathfinder with the 1769 Gaspar de Portola Expedition during which he discovered San Francisco Bay (later named in his honor) from a hill above Pacifica, established forts and mission at an Diego and San Juan Capistrano, and was the Commandante and founder of the El Presidio Santa Barbara. Jean also is a direct descendant of two of the founders of Los Angeles in 1781 known as Los Pobladores.

Due to a very reluctant and teary family move to Chicago in 1940, she spent the next 10 years there and graduated from the University of Illinois in 1950 with a BS in Liberal Arts & Science with the intension of pursuing a career in medical technology. Instead in May 1950, she took her final exams early and married Bob who she met at U. of I. They worked that summer as Forest Service Lookouts atop an Idaho mountain, settled at Washington State U. where Bob earned his PhD in chemistry. In 2000, they had just celebrated 50 wonderful years together when Bob tragically died. She is proud of their four college graduate sons, and five grandchildren – the youngest 8 months old. Jean is happy that they all now live in California and very grateful that son Tom lives with her.

In 1956, Jean joined AAUW Fullerton Branch and immediately became involved in study groups (as they were known then) and leadership roles including that of vice-president. She says that AAUW provided much needed social contacts and intellectual stimulation to divert her from the daily routines of diapers, runny noses, and dirty dishes during the next 10 years. After moving to Laguna Beach in 1967, she became a Charter Member of AAUW Laguna Beach Branch and has been a continuous and active member holding various leadership roles including two terms as president, editor of our membership directory, and co-founder of our annual Literary Luncheon

fundraiser 33 years ago.

In the community, Jean worked in environmental groups and related bond



issues for the establishment of the Laguna Greenbelt and Wilderness Park. She organized volunteer programs at Top of the World Elementary School and Thurston Middle School when they opened in 1967, and was one of the first volunteer tutors at El Morro Elementary School. For four years, Jean owned and operated a gourmet cookware shop on Forest Ave. during which time she created a contest among members to name our branch newsletter -- Laguna Waves -- first produced by her in booklet form.

Past joys with her family included birdwatching, hiking, backpacking, a very long trip to Alaska in a camper, and another long car trip to the northeastern states and Quebec. She feels very fortunate to have traveled much of Europe with her late husband when he was research director of U.S. Borax -- a British owned company based in London.

Jean's interests are reading and being involved in branch fundraising activities. Currently, she is chair of the Books@1:30 interest group, and as branch board membership coordinator, she reminds members that membership in AAUW provides personal and professional growth, and a support system of dynamic, educated people throughout the state and nation.

When the coronavirus threat has lifted and AAUW activities resume, she encourages members to participate in interest groups and fundraising events, to volunteer for leadership roles, and stay engaged in helping advance AAUW's gender equity work in making educational and career dreams come true for women and girls.

TLC REPORT

The Learning Club (TLC) suspended operation in mid-March when the Laguna Beach Schools shut down their campuses and made the transition to distance learning. Since the beginning of January, 27 tutors and 8 substitutes had been providing twice-weekly tutoring to 17 students who were in need of additional support to better succeed in school. It was an abrupt and disappointing end to what had been a smooth and successful start to the program's 21st year of tutoring and mentoring students at El Morro Elementary School.

Overlooked No More! Dr. June Almeida

Dr. June Almeida died in 2007 at the age of 77. She was a Scottish virologist, a pioneer in virus imaging, identification and diagnosis. Her skills in electron microscopy earned her an international reputation. Now thirteen years after her death, she is finally getting the recognition she deserves as a pioneer whose work speeded up an understanding of the virus that is currently spreading throughout the world.

COVID-19 is a new illness but it is caused by a coronavirus of the type first identified by Dr. Almeida in 1964 at her laboratory in St Thomas's Hospital in London. Her paper to a peer-reviewed journal was rejected at the time "because the referees said the images she produced were just bad pictures of influenza virus particles."

Dr. June Almeida succeeded in identifying viruses that were previously unknown, including in 1966, a group of viruses that was later named coronavirus. Her immune electron microscopy (IEM) innovations and insights contributed to research related to the diagnosis of hepatitis B, HIV, and rubella, among other viral diseases. Her electron micrographs continue to be included in virology review textbooks, decades after she produced them.
